# History in the Story

The Danube is the second-biggest and second-longest river in Europe after the Volga. It's about 2.850 km long! From source to mouth it drops down 1,078 m, flowing at speeds of 1 to 3 metres per second.

#### The source

of the Danube is in Donaueschingen in the Black Forest. Because three rivers meet there it is not really clear where the actual source is.

## In the Danube Delta

in Romania and Ukraine the river flows into the Black Sea. Because the exact source isn't known, the river is not measured in the direction of flow, which is how it's usually done, but against the current. So the stone marking "kilometre 0" of the river is at its mouth in the Danube Delta instead of at the source.

# Shipping

The Danube is already a transport route in Roman times. Wood, metal, salt and animal skins are among the goods carried on the river. When travelling upstream, the first ships are pulled along by draught animals and sometimes by people. The untamed river is a big challenge and a big danger. Sailors who know the local conditions (like those in Grein) can prove their skill and earn good money.

# The untamed Danube

remains a sprawling river system into the 19th century, with countless branches, side channels and islands. It also moves so many stones and so much sediment that its appearance changes all the time: new islands are formed, others wear away. In the region called Strudengau the river is dotted with many swirling whirlpools and treacherous rocks.

The shipping museum in Grein Castle tells the story of shipping

Hausstein Castle stands on a romantic rocky island in the Danube. In 1854 it is blown up because its island causes the river's biggest whirlpool.

# A Rare Nase

There aren't many places left where the Danube can flow freely. The Wachau is one, the Donau-Auen National Park another. Many animals and fish that live in fast-flowing water have become rare—like the vimba bream. > Danube Nymph



and other birds find refuge in the untamed stretches of the Danube. The corncrake needs tall, damp meadows to breed in. Because more and more of these riverside areas are being cultivated, the corncrake is now very rare.



TheDonau-AuenNationalParkconserves nature and threatened species. The river is virtually free-flowing here, providing a habitat for a huge variety of plants and animals.

#### **Danube Giants**

7.2 metres long and weighing in at over 1.5 tonnes: that's the biggest sturgeon ever caught. This fish is better known as the beluga (caviar) and travels up to 2,000 km to lay its eggs. In the Danube these fish can grow to lengths of over two metres.



In Passau, three rivers coming from three directions all meet: the blue Danube, the green Inn and the black Itz. After meeting, they still keep their different colours for a while.

## Colourful Rivers and Seas

In the world of ASAGAN the story of the DANUBE is rewritten.

Many bodies of water around the world have a colour in their name. That started with the Ottomans who named the four points of the compass after colours: black was the north, white the west, red the south and blue the east. So from their point of view the Red Sea was in the south, the Black Sea in the north.

This is the title of the Danube waltz by Johann Strauss. The words come from a poem by Karl Isidor Beck that jokingly calls the river blue. Or maybe we call the Danube blue because it flows east?


